In Memoriam - Lew Rems

Central Oregon birder Lew Rems died on January 1, 2025, at the age of 79 after living with dementia for the last decade of his life. He was born on October 27, 1945, in Abington, Pennsylvania. He graduated from Penn State University, earning a degree in Forestry.

His career took him to the New York State Museum, where his job required him to collect birds and prepare the skins for the institution's bird collection. After a few years, he quit because he couldn't bear killing more birds. So, in 1975 Lew moved to Central Oregon, drawn to the area's outdoor opportunities.

He worked at Lake Creek Lodge for many years. He put up bird feeders and bird houses, mostly that he had built himself. If you ever saw birds there, it's likely because of Lew's actions. Ownership has changed and bird feeding is minimal now but for years it was a popular place for birders to stay and find central Oregon specialties right there on the property. A half dozen of my first Jefferson County sightings were at Lake Creek Lodge thanks to Lew.

Lew was an excellent birder and a good friend for many years. Birders universally called him quiet, humble, respectful and a keen observer. While he preferred birding on his own, he always shared his sightings. He would visit Hatfield Lake at sunrise and then call me at my office to report his finds. On several occasions he would find something outstanding and I would dash out there in my coat and tie to join him in sharing a good bird. Because of him I began storing binoculars under the driver's seat of my car so I didn't have to drive home first, retrieve my bins and then reverse direction and head out to Hatfield.

The last time I got to bird with him was at Tumalo Reservoir in April 2023 when we got to enjoy a Long-billed Curlew found earlier that day. That was only the second one I had seen in the county; appropriately the other one was with Lew at Hatfield Lake 40 years earlier.

Lew is survived by his wife of 47 years, Carol Hughes, a son, daughter and grandson.

REMEMBRANCES

Lew was a talented birder and a great person. He was a bit reclusive but, if you ever had a chance to spend some time with him, you would find him to be surprisingly talkative, friendly, and profoundly interesting. Lew's pioneering efforts to catalog Central Oregon's birds place him

in the rarified company of Tom Crabtree, Craig Miller, and Peter Low. He is credited (many times with other birders) with 30 first county records from Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson, Sherman and Wheeler counties. Thoughtful, quiet, and committed to the birds. That's what Lew was. He was just a great guy and we old-timers will miss him greatly.

I was fairly new to central Oregon birding when I first met Lew, at Hatfield, one of his frequent haunts. And it was Peter Low who made that initial introduction. What a dynamic duo. When they got on a rare bird, it was quite an education to witness their thought process, inspection of field marks, and recall of an obscure chip note -- all from memory. No Sibley, no Merlin required. Around Thanksgiving of 2013, my father was visiting me. He wanted to walk off some pecan pie, so we headed to Hatfield. There I ran into Lew and a blizzard of Cedar Waxwings (my eBird list said 250, but that's just my typical undercount, it was a mind-boggling number). And perched in a juniper almost motionless in the waxwing blizzard were 2 Bohemian Waxwing, the first I'd seen in my short time in Oregon. That was a sighting and chance encounter with Lew I'll always remember. Again, I checked and my eBird list recorded 3 observers -- my dad, Lew, and me. Others have already commented on his decency and pleasant disposition. It came quite naturally to him. There are many nice people, but very few in Lew's league.

As a relatively new birder I often felt guided and led under "the wing" of Lew, so to speak, during our birding times together. I felt honored when he would call and invite me to bird with him. He always showed respect for the birds and patience with me while learning. I remember being with him when he found the Stilt Sandpiper in Crook County, and when he called me to join him in seeing the Godwit on irrigation district land. He very much respected the space birds need as he would ever so quietly creep up to take a photo. Lew was a very quiet and humble individual who respected all of our natural world. I shall miss his enjoyable talks we shared.

Lew was a quiet and respectful person with a friendly disposition and a passion for birds. His long list of great finds for Central Oregon demonstrates his exceptional ability, observational skills and meticulous note-taking. Most weekends would find us at the Hatfield Ponds or that magical place, Wickiup Reservoir. One such time we found the first Little Stint for Central Oregon; it was a beautiful Fall day with lots of shorebirds, we were in our element. Another occasion, on a very windy day at the Dam we had a juvenile Long-tailed Jaeger on the shore, not 25 ft. away, feeding on a Catfish. I know Lew got some great pictures. He loved those times, and I'm just glad I got to share the joy with my friend Lew. I was very fortunate to have Lew as a friend, we birded together on many occasions during his later years and I visited him and his wife Carol regularly thereafter.

Days Lew and I spent together birding were always productive and full of good conversation. He had keen vision, birding in those days without a scope–just binoculars. Oregon's third accepted record of a Black-headed Gull was one of his most impressive finds. He was a collector of drawings by artists who drew the plates for a popular field guide, one of which he gave as a wedding present to Marilyn and me which still hangs on our bedroom wall. The Central Oregon birding community is richly blessed for having had him in our midst.

Summer Lake Shorebird Survey, Saturday & Sunday, May 31 and June 1, 2025, Volunteers conduct counts of all shorebirds and other waterbirds (excluding waterfowl and American Coots) across the entire Summer Lake Wildlife Area. The survey was established in 2009 to monitor breeding shorebird and other waterbird populations and to document bird responses to habitat enhancement and management actions in each of Summer Lake Wildlife Area's habitat management units. The Summer Lake Shorebird Survey has been conducted annually (except in 2020) since 2009. On average, over 3,100 shorebirds representing the 9 breeding species have been counted. In addition, about 5 non-breeding shorebird species have been found each year. Since 2009, a total of 22 different shorebird species have been recorded including uncommon or rare species such as Red Knot, Wandering Tattler and Whimbrel. Other waterbirds such as waders, gulls & terns, grebes, pelicans & cormorants, Sandhill Cranes and rails are also counted and average over 1,300 individuals and over 20 species. In the past, the group found about 120 species of birds throughout the weekend of counting and birding. Volunteers count from vehicles along roads, and/or by foot hiking along dikes and levees, crosscountry and/or wading through marsh and shallow ponds to survey all types of wetland habitat. In the past, bicycles, canoes and kayaks have been used in some areas. Binoculars are essential and the use of spotting scopes in many areas is encouraged. Volunteers meet at River Campground on Summer Lake Wildlife Area at 7:30 am and are assigned specific areas to survey. Historically, some volunteers have camped at one of the Wildlife Area's four primitive sites. Others have chosen commercial lodging at the Lodge at Summer Lake. Cabin Lake Bird Blinds

Formerly a Forest Service Guard Station that housed permanent staff prior to the expansion of Forest Service road networks, Cabin Lake is now a tranquil place that is home to the birds and mammals of Central Oregon. Cabin Lake sits on the boundary between eastern Cascade pine forests and high desert and attracts birds from both habitats. These residents (and migrants) come for the water provided by an old but still effective guzzler system. The components to a guzzler include a corrugated roofing platform that collects and delivers precipitation to a storage tank, plus a delivery basin for the wildlife. These artificial water sources are a relic of the fifties, meant to provide water for wildlife that relied on sources that no longer exist. There are thousands of them scattered throughout central and eastern Oregon.

The addition of bird blinds and the efforts of many volunteers over the years have made Cabin Lake an important outpost for the birding community of Central Oregon and beyond. A quick review of eBird informs us that 561 birders have submitted 1,313 checklists and have identified 148 different species. ECBA continues to support and fund the work that is required to keep the blinds and the guzzler system in good working order. Currently that work is done by Clayton Crofton who has managed to restore the guzzler to good working order – no small thing, for which he deserves the Board's appreciation and all of our thanks for his efforts in preserving a small but important birding outpost for Central Oregon.

Categories range from state, to county, to local lists – some life, some just the year 2024. More people are participating in categories like birds photographed or audio recorded. New record numbers have been reached in many categories. Two birders jumped into the top ten year list group. Two other birders jumped into the 100- and 125-birds-in-every-county categories.
